Men's Half Marathon Champion - Joaquim Jeronimo

On a tough course at the Worksop Half Marathon, he ran a 7min PB, clocking an outstanding 1:19:32 in his first HM for 3 years.

Men's Marathon Champion - Piers Pye-Watson

This year's winner is someone who's reclaiming his crown from 2021.

After a busy spring marathon season where we had more sub 3hr performances than ever before, Piers decided to go against the grain a run a low-profile autumn race. In only his 3rd marathon and he exceeded even his own expectation to clock a massive 7min PB with a time of 2:50:21 at the Chester Marathon.

This is the fastest marathon by a GRC runner for 3.5 years and moves to 4th all time for the club

Ladies Marathon Champion - Caroline Davis

This year's winner is a runner who does not stop.

Seasoned at the distance, Caroline targeted Manchester and it paid off. Running her 14th marathon, she set a new PB by 0:01:30 to clock a time of 3:46:00.

Amazingly she ran the London Marathon the week later for her 15th marathon.

2023 Ultra Runner of the Year - Nick Payne

Ladies Club Champion - Catherine Payne

Men's Club GP Series Champion - Russel Whittaker

With 21 men qualifying, it was a bumper crop of athletes battling it out with some very close rankings!

Scoring the required 6 races were, Richard Urquhart, Ben Mason, Anthony Boyle, Martin Rodell and Stuart Baty, all showing consistency throughout.

Then came Sam Dodwell, Tommy Napier, Simon Allsopp, Kevin Wallace who were separated by just 2.4 percentage points.

Peter Jennings, and Andrew Pask were all vying for a top ten berth, but not quite. Just beating Andrew into 10th was Daniel Pearce.

The prolific Paul Davis ran more GP races than anyone else. He laced up his shoes a bumper 15 times and broke 1000 points with his best 6 placing him in 9^{th.}

Stefan Latter, Number 1 Atter (Robin) and Number 1 Jepson (Paul) again were locked in battle all year with only 1.2% separating the trio. Robert McArdle took 5th and Alan Carley 4th proving there is life in the old dogs yet.

A stunning year in almost every single distance paints the picture of all the top three.

The most experienced in 3rd, Peter Bonner who's now on the cusp of the prestigious 80%.

Two of the most talented runners in the local area, with PB's galore, Gold County Medals, Gold Age Grading standards for both (the first time for each) and over the 6-race series were separated by just 1.4%...

In 2nd place - he averaged 79.47% with a high of 80.75% is is Joaquim Jeronimo (Flash)

The winner of the Men's GP Series 2023 with an average of 79.70 and a high of 80.56%, is Russel Whittaker.



Ladies Club GP Series Champion - Catherine Payne

With 15 ladies completing the required 6 races, Yvonne Buckley, Judi Allsopp, Tracy Webb, Ros Sadler and Holly Wragg finished just outside the top 10.

Zoë Wragg nudged her younger sister to tenth but they were separated by just 7½ points. The sisterly battle will be one to watch for 2024.

Early season Naomi Rivers form and a late season resurgent Sylv Hull next in 8th and 9th.

Making great waves in her first year with the club the talented Carlene Veasey who came in at 7th.

Julie Gilbert, Marj Spendlow and Caroline Davis made up 6th, 5th and 4th - showcasing their determination and longevity.

Nathan Walker Memorial Trophy - Nick Payne

The Nathan Walker Memorial Trophy 'is awarded to the member who has made an outstanding contribution to the club or has been recognised for an outstanding achievement at a race event as either part of a team or as a solo participant'.

This honours Nathan, one of our most promising athletes who tragically died in 2016. and son of two of our most popular members Ady and CJ Walker who died tragically in 2016.

The Committee provides Ady & CJ with 3 nominations and reasons. Ady & CJ decide on the winner. However, this year it was impossible to whittle it down enough and we presented Ady & CJ with 4 nominations

Nick was awarded the trophy after an achievement which may never be beaten in terms of endurance and determination.

Nick ran from Lands end to John O'Groats the long way round!! Taking in the Brecon Beacons, the lake district, the west highland way and the Scottish highlands.

Nick covered over 1000 miles over 35 days, 31 days running and only 4 recovery days.

Nick ran in memory of his father who passed away a few years ago and raised £2500 for the pancreatic trust.
